Last month we were privileged to have had Orlando Graeff as our speaker. He provided an amazing




Zooming in: Tillandsia stricta is blooming now. Photo by Juliana Raposo

Speaker Jerry Raack

At our Zoom meeting at 10 AM on February 13, 2021, we will be honored in having Jerry Raack (*Tillandsia raackii*) as speaker. Make plans to attend since this

presentation is full of growing hints and lots of incredible photos. This program will NOT be recorded for later availability. Jerry has been a director on the board of the Bromeliad Society International, and a past president of the BSI. He has traveled the world extensively and been collecting/studying trips for bromeliads

trips for bromeliads in Brazil, Costa Rica, Ecuador and Peru. He has been to Ecuador 7 different times, most recently in January of 2018, and January of 2019. He has discovered a

number of new species of bromeliads and is currently in the process of working with both Eric Gouda and Jose Manzanares in naming, describing and publishing some of these. Even though he lives in Ohio, which gets very cold in the winter and hot in the summer, he maintains an extensive collection of bromeliads with an emphasis on soft-leaved Tillandsia and Guzmania, many of them from higher elevations.

This presentation will focus on what we can learn about the native habitats of bromeliads that can be applied to our everyday ability to try and grow various bromeliads. It will focus on 2 days of a trip he took in June 2015 with Jose Manzanares and Eric Gouda, as well as some of his own travel in January 2018 and 2019 to Ecuador. Through examination of the different environments that are seen in the 2 days he will highlight what we can learn and how to apply that information to our own growing environments. There will be lots of photos of bromeliads in their native habitat, with some new species that were discovered being presented.

By the way, our February speaker Jerry Raack is one of the WBC Sarasota 2021 speakers. He occasionally writes articles for the BSI Journal narrating his experience in growing super rare or understated bromeliads in his greenhouse in Ohio. He makes it look easy, but it's certainly not. The third interesting aspect of bromeliad societies in the Zoom Age is that some of these talks were recorded and are available for watching, such as Orlando Graeff's last month. 

By making the archive public, we invite the public at large to learn more about growing bromeliads in San Diego and see what the San Diego Bromeliad Society is about.




