May you continue to enjoy working with your bromeliads and other plants. May everyone stay healthy. Safe and happy growing to everyone.


## March Meeting

Saturday, March 13 @ 10am on Zoom Speaker Dr. Claudia Hornung-Leoni

Important: This month the Zoom meeting will be hosted by Andrew Wilson, not Scott Sandel. Be on the lookout for an email from Andrew with the meeting credentials.

Our March program will be by Dr. Claudia Hornung-Leoni. The program will be Floral Characteristics in Bromeliads with interesting points about the shapes and colors of the flowers, some characteristics of the nectars found in bromeliad flowers, and the relationship of visitors to the plants (e.g. pollinators and predators). There will be many photos of the plants.

Dr. Hornung-Leoni, originally from Venezuela, is currently a Teacher -Researcher at Universidad Autónoma del Estado de Hidalgo, Pachuca, Mexico, in both undergraduate and postgraduate studies. She does research in Botany and Systematics (Taxonomy). Her main lines of research are: 1) traditional and phylogenetic systematics, 2) evolution of characters and studies of morphological variation (allometry and morphometry), 3) interaction of animal-plant, phytotelmata and relationship between floral biology and pollination. She has done fieldwork in Venezuela, Peru, Chile, México and some locations in Colombia.

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
