## February Meeting

Saturday, February 12 @ 10am

The February meeting will take place in Casa del Prado, room 104 in Balboa Park and will also be live on Zoom. The Zoom invitation will be sent via email. Presentations will not be recorded.

This month we will have 2 speakers.

SDBS member Juliana Raposo just returned from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil where alcantareas were blooming everywhere – in gardens and in the mountains. This bromeliad genus is endemic to eastern Brazil. In this presentation, you'll see plenty of Alcantarea, at times as a focal point in bromeliad collections, or nearly undetectable on rugged mountain sides. We will also see other interesting broms from Brazilian collections including a few newly registered hybrids.

Next, we will have SDBS's own Dave Kennedy who will provide us with a tour of the plant table plus those tillandsias he has brought in. He will deal with their characteristics and for beginners, which of them are easier to grow. It will be an interactive session so don't hesitate to ask questions. The opportunity table will be an even split between tillandsias from Dave Kennedy's collection and offsets from Michael's Bromeliads in Venice, Florida.

## The Resilience of Bromeliads

One of the first bromeliad meetings I attended, I won a bunch of bromeliads on the opportunity table that were bare rooted. I took them home, laid them under an orange tree with the intention of potting them in a few days. Days turned into months, and I was very surprised to find that the billbergias I had just laid down without potting, were thriving and sending out blooms from their prone position. I decided right then that the bromeliad family was for me!

A more recent example of just how resilient bromeliads are came after the Lilac Fire of 2017. Rainforest Flora suffered enormous damage to

their greenhouse growing facility during that fire. Shortly after the fire, a number of SDBS members volunteered some time to help Paul Isley try to recover the mostly burned plants. During the cleanup, I took one particularly burned tillandsia home with me at the end of the day to see if it could be saved. For the first year, I began to believe that the plant was beyond recovery. Into the second year, however, I was encouraged to see new growth emerging. Neary 4 years after the fire, that very small, burned tillandsia bloomed! I believe it to be a streptophylla. Never give up on a bromeliad!



### Portea silveirae

Portea silveirae is a species from Brazil, endemic to Bahia, Espirito Santo and Minas Gerais states. It is blooming now in my garden and in many of yours, too. This is a phenomenal landscape plant. When grown in full sun - it takes full sun! it keeps its leaves a delightful lime green rather than acquiring a maroon tan. It has a graceful, compact structure with shorter, more erect leaves than other porteas, and boasts the best inflorescence to rosette ratio of any portea that I know, including Portea Candy, my old favorite. P. silverae seems to have a more branched inflorescence as well. The pink and purple flower spikes stays brightly colored for weeks.



## **New SDBS Treasurer Needed**

The San Diego Bromeliad Society is in search of a new treasurer to replace the current treasurer. The starting date would be in January of 2023 to allow time for the new treasurer to transition. The position involves:

- Filing and paying quarterly sales tax (easy using Quicken software)
- Provide credit card capability at meetings and the annual show and sale
- Handling sales, raffle and auction money at meetings and the annual show and sale
- Depositing membership dues payments and notifying the membership chairman
- Writing occasional checks to reimburse members for supplies, pay speakers, plant purchases, etc.
- Checking the SDBS PO Box weekly.

The prospective treasurer should be somewhat familiar with a financial software program such as Quicken but it isn't required. It would also be nice to have a smart phone with a data plan although not necessary. (The personal data usage for SDBS business is minimal). I have spent the last few years putting together a checklist of items to be completed each month with appropriate website addresses, usernames, passwords and any other information required for each report. That sounds complex but in reality, there are only a couple of months that require some time - November and July. As a board member, you are entitled to attend board meetings, currently held every other month by Zoom.


