Saturday, March 11, 2023 at 10am in Casa del Prado, room 104, Balboa Park

Requests for talks to help newer members (and maybe some older ones) learn about the bromeliad family of plants has resulted in a program this month consisting of three short talks on dyckias, vrieseas and hohenbergias. They are not the most commonly grown bromeliads, but you will occasionally see them on the plant table or on the auction block. They are beautiful plants with characters all their own. In each talk you'll hear about their background information including how to recognize them.

Robert Kopfstein will entertain us with his knowledge and tales of encounters with the Dyckia guys. He will talk about the care and successful growing and showing of these fearsome but elegant beauties.

scott Sandel, our erstwhile champion of Neoregelia, will show and discuss his successes with the Vriesea clan, how to keep the plants immaculate and ready to show and where to find these foliage queens.

Andrew Wilson, aided and abetted by Dan Kinnard and Eloise Lau, will introduce you to the Hohenbergia crowd and to the styles of living they expect whether sunning on the beach, hiding out in the forest or getting by in the hard places. He will indicate how to treat these diverse but assertive characters.

Gift of Bromeliad memorabilia from Thelma O'Reilly

Who was Thelma O'Reilly?

Thelma O'Reilly was a plant enthusiast from San Diego who dedicated much of her life to growing bromeliads and a lifetime of the study of them. She passed away in 2021 at the age of 103.

Originally from the East coast where she grew begonias Thelma discovered bromeliads and cactus and succulents, plants she found she could grow outside in her garden in San Diego when she moved here in 1961.

She is one of the founding members of the San Diego Bromeliad Society. In 1965, May 10 to be exact, she along with Cleovis Hardin, his wife Jackie and a small group of bromeliad lovers formed the SDBS. They met at the Hardin's nursery.

She was also a member of the Bromeliad Society International and served on the board for a number of years. Among the large collection of her papers, I found the original letter from the SDBS applying for affiliation to the BSI written in t967.

Michael Ludwig, Thelma's begonia friend is going through her lifetime collection of plant related memorabilia to sort out bromeliad related items for us.


He brought us 4 boxes of a lifetime of collecting and saving information about bromeliads. Included are correspondence, newsletters from local societies and those throughout the United States and from as far away as Australia, and journals in Portuguese. There is a collection of BSI Journals and Journals from the Cryptanthus Society, as well as books pertaining to bromeliads in Portuguese and German.

Michael says that he still has things he is going through so he will bring us more items in the future.

We cannot keep all of the materials, some are duplicates, so items will be available at meetings for interested members to adopt. Perhaps, someone will find some interesting information that they would like to

share with the rest of us via an article for the newsletter or a short information blurb at a meeting.

January Meeting Recap

The January program was an unusual and exciting treatment of the bromeliad topic. Our speaker, Kristen Jepsen, Director of the IGM Genomics Center at UCSD, expanded our knowledge of genomics and how it applies to the study of bromeliads.

Her presentation was a Genomics 101 type of talk where she inserted bits about the papers that were recently published on the topic of DNA analysis of bromeliads and how it changed the taxonomic treatment of lots of species — and those pesky name changes. Dr Jepsen explained in layman terms how the gene sequencing is done, and how it brings to light a lot of information that can't be gauged by observing morphological traits alone.

As the speakers committee said, "This marks a significant departure from the type of speaker we invite to our meetings". A round of applause goes to Andrew Wilson, Dan Kinnard and Eloise Lau, who brought us this informative talk and so many others over the years. They are about to pass the baton to a new speakers committee, and it will be a tough act to follow!



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

Donald D. Nelson

December 11, 1934 - February 25, 2023



Donald (Don) Nelson was born in Rockford, Illinois to parents Einer, a Swedish immigrant, and Ferne Nelson on December 11, 1934. Donnie, as he was often called by his family, grew up in Rockford where he lived with his older brother Roger, and younger sister Janice and where several of his extended family still reside.

He joined the Air Force in 1954, spending almost 4 years in the service. He recalled fondly his travels across the world during that time. Throughout his life he enjoyed activities such as backpacking and camping. He and his wife, Mary Carolin occasionally traveled within California, often exploring the central coast and state and national parks featuring the sequoias and redwoods. A weeklong backpacking trip to the Sierra Nevada mountains that Don and Andrea took together is

an experience that both treasured. More recently, Don joined on a trip to Williams, AZ with his grandchildren to take the Polar Express train, where many laughs were enjoyed and lifelong memories created.

Don was innately and insatiably curious and loved learning about many different things all things plants, of course, but also history, architecture and model trains to name a few of his interests. After his retirement as a salesman from Frazee Paints in the late 90s, Don leaned into his enthusiasm around plants and nature and

became an active member of local organizations such as the Palomar Cactus & Succulent Society, Quail Gardens (now the San Diego Botanic Garden), the San Diego Bromeliad Society, Alta Vista Gardens, and others. He enjoyed being a docent, serving on the board, meeting people and attending events associated with these organizations.

Don met his wife of 55 years, Mary Carolin, in 1965 and they were married in 1967. They moved to Escondido in 1970 to raise their family. They shared a love of nature and of gardening, as well as of their dear friends and their families. They also shared their strong faith and in recent years were engaged with the people and events at Trinity. Don was preceded in death by his wife, Mary Carolin and is survived by daughters Maria and Andrea, son in

law Tory and two grandchildren, Katrina and Alyssa. He is also survived by his sister-in-law, Jean and several family members who reside in Illinois.

Episcopal Church in Escondido on
March 10th at 11am with a light
lunch to follow. The family
